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end of Kings Landing Historical Settlement is a tiny cabin that played a huge role in the community of Hanwell's history. The Killeen Cabin has been at Kings Landing since 1974, but it was originally built around 1826 by one of Hanwell's founding families.

Originally from Galway, Ireland, Timothy Killeen and Mary Noonan were hoping to flee poverty. "Times in Ireland were hard. I lived through two rebellions in my youth and the Napoleonic Wars," said Chris Little, the actor who portrays Timothy Killeen at Kings Landing. The state of life in Ireland at the time was daunting. Due to overpopulation in the 18th century, agricultural conflicts were common. In fact, only three acres could be given to each resident. Out of 20 million acres, only thirteen and a half million were fit to be used for farming. The Killeens left with hopes of finding a brighter future in Canada and set their sights on New Brunswick.

When the Killeens reached New Brunswick, they didn't initially settle in Hanwell. They landed in Saint John during the winter of 1822 and stayed with another family. That following September they acquired their first plot of land in Tay Creek, off the Nashwaak River. A few years later that land burnt making it home. "I did not want to

settle on a land that was all burnt. I wanted trees with which I could build a home", said Killeen.

It was after that tragedy that the Killeens set their sights on settling land in Hanwell. However, acquiring land in the area was not easy and took years of negotiating with the provincial government. Killeen joined with about 32 other settlers, including his brother in law, Timothy Noonan, and his friend Michael Harrigan, to form a group called "The Hanwell Settlers". They worked tirelessly to acquire land in the rear of Kingsclear Parish, which would later be called "The Hanwell Settlement". But the land came with various conditions laid out by the Province. After two years, the settlers would have to pay an annual rent of two shillings to the provincial government every summer, after five years, they had to have cleared or fertilized three acres for every fifty acres granted, and after three years, they were required to build a cabin and to have three cattle for every fifty acres of their grant. Lastly, if the ground was fit for agriculture of flax or hemp, they had to grow one of the crops.

In 1826, most of the Hanwell Settlers, including the Killeens, could repay their land grants and start building their homes. Killeen was given the lot number 25. "I've been given 200 acres of land here but the first few years, I didn't clear enough land to farm," said Killeen. The cabin he and his wife built was of a square and made of logs. Inside, was a large stove, a fireplace, small windows, and a white-wash interior. Two tables were set in the house, for working and eating, and the family slept in beds stuffed with straw. "It's a lovely place and I hope to leave it to my children someday," he said.

While the Killeen Cabin doesn't belong to the family anymore, it is toured and admired by thousands of others who visit Kings Landing each year. When the historical settlement acquired the cabin, it was deemed a significant part of New Brunswick's history. Peter John Stokes, a consulting restoration architect, described the house as "the most complete example of a pioneer dwelling with all characteristics of an early settler's house". It's also what remains of the demanding work and determination of 32 settlers, founding families if you will, who wanted a better life and saw the potential for it in Hanwell. Almost a hundred years later, it's a vision still shared by the nearly five thousand residents who live here today.
