

A Safer Community HANWELL'S NEW FIRE STATION



By now you have likely driven by our newest building - Hanwell's own fire station. This building is the largest investment your municipal government has made so far in the community. Here is how it came about.

In 2015, a Fire Services Study was completed for the rural community of Hanwell. The report was written by John T. Redden, GIFireE CFPS of OPTA Information Intelligence and can be found on www.hanwell.nb.ca. This report not only identified the need for the fire station but also size, location, and other criteria.

Once the need was identified, the design phase got underway. Meetings were held between Hanwell's Facilities Committee, the Upper Kingsclear Fire Department - our fire protection service provider, and the New Brunswick Department of Local Government. Over a period of several months, the final design was created, and the project went to tender. We were thrilled when a local contractor, King Construction, was awarded the approximately \$1,025,000 project.

The construction phase of the fire station was overseen by Regional Service Commission 11 and municipal staff. Because of their great efforts, the project was completed ahead of schedule and on budget.



In January 2018, the fire station came alive with the arrival of equipment and firefighters from the Upper Kingsclear Fire Department. Mayor, Council, and staff were elated one evening in January when we got to meet with Chief Murray Crouse and the firefighters in their new building. All of us were proud of what had been accomplished. This project is a wonderful

example of what can be accomplished when Hanwell's municipal government works together with the Upper Kingsclear Fire Department, the Province of New Brunswick, and the Regional Service Commission. Watch for details of the upcoming grand opening!

Not only does the addition of a new fire station help protect or community, but it could have an impact on your homeowner's insurance premiums. We recommend you contact your insurance broker and advise them of two things: 1) The fire station is equipped and operational. It is located at 2076 route 640. 2) The Superior Tanker Shuttle Service accreditation is in place for 850 imperial gallons per minute for all Upper Kingsclear fire stations including our own Station Two. This accreditation is a result of several aspects of our fire protection service including, the fire station location, the installation of two dry hydrants throughout our community, and the highly skilled and passionate members of the Upper Kingsclear Fire Department.

Sentinel Emergency System provides information to Hanwell residents in the case of an emergency. There is no charge to sign up and you can receive notifications by email, text, and/or voice mail. You can also sign up to five people per household. If you have friends or neighbours that do not have a computer, please feel free to sign-up for them.

All you need to do is go to the Hanwell website at **www.hanwell.nb.ca** and click on the Sentinel icon and follow the instructions. You will only receive messages in the case of significant emergencies, such as: forest fire, major power outage, or major road closure. You will NOT be notified for a school closure or snow storm. Hopefully you will never need to receive a message from this system; however, we have all found out in the past few years that being prepared is important.



SNOW REMOVAL INQUIRIES

We have been receiving a lot of inquiries regarding snow removal. Just a friendly reminder that as a rural community we do not have any control over the roads, road maintenance, or snow removal. Nonetheless, we do appreciate knowing that you have concerns, so feel free to contact the office at 460-1177; however, it is also important to contact DTI at 453-2611. We want to track these issues so that we can talk about them with DTI at our next meeting.
