Inspired by Nature

Light Pollution and Its Effects

There are many different forms of pollution, some of which are familiar to most people. Things like air, water, and noise, are all common types of pollution that you often hear about in the news. But there is another form of pollution that you don't hear about very often, but is beginning to become more of a problem, and that is light pollution. Pollution is defined as the presence in or introduction into the environment of a substance or thing that has harmful or poisonous effects.



What are the harmful effects of 'too much light'? After all, most people would agree that having things like lights at intersections certainly improves safety at night. But there are many areas that are less obvious, where it could be a problem. Over the past decade, large increases in suburban lighting have been found to cause migratory problems for animals. Something called the "color temperature" of the lights is also important, as lights that are "true white" (high color temperature) confuse animals into thinking it's daytime, when it isn't. These white (usually LED) lights have also been shown to disrupt sleep patterns in humans. Putting excessive lighting where it serves no purpose also impacts vegetation/plant growth.

Buildings that install excessive lighting for nighttime, often without security cameras even watching the areas that are being lit, can produce harmful glare for drivers. Your eyes adjust to light levels that surround you, and when you start to approach a heavily lit building or parking lot, it actually reduces safety, from the high glare making it difficult to see. And then after you pass the lit area, your eyes are still adjusting to the more intense light that you just passed, and now your vision is limited when it returns to normal lighting levels.



You may ask yourself: Well, I'm not running a business with a big parking lot, so what can I do? If you are using things like a dusk to dawn light, do you have it in an area where it's providing the most benefit to your own yard, or are you lighting up a neighbor's yard with it? There are light fixtures that are also "dark sky certified", that have things attached to them to properly cut off the light direction, so that it's going where it's supposed to go (lighting paths and driveways, for example) and not where it shouldn't go (straight out, or straight up). You may also want to consider using lights with a lower color temperature (more in the 'yellow' range, that people have long been used to seeing with incandescent bulbs), as this is less harmful to vegetation, animals, and people.


Hanwell Days 2020





A SCHOOL FOR HANWELL: An Update

On Monday January 27th, we had the architectural renderings of our new K-8 school unveiled at Hanwell Place. The Honourable Dominic Cardy, Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development and MLA for Hanwell, along with Anglophone School District - West Superintendent David McTimony and District Education Council Chair Kimberley Douglas, spoke to the need for this school in Hanwell. As Mayor, I feel very strongly that the construction of this school will be the heart of our community in the future.



The new school is scheduled to be completed in January 2022. Located on the property adjacent to our new recreation centre, the school's outdoor track will intersect with the current Hanwell trails. This will allow teachers to engage their students in outdoor programs, exploring nature. The school is designed to include state of the art amenities. There will be 2 gymnasiums, a performing arts and music area, outdoor classrooms are to be included in addition to the classrooms and other common areas. This is a school designed for the education of our community's youth.

If you haven't had an opportunity to view all of the renderings, please drop by the Rural Community offices and staff will be happy to share them with you.

This is a great investment in our community's future and in the development of the youth of Hanwell.

Medicine Cabinet Clean-Up

Spring is here and it's time for a major cleanup.... Don't forget the medicine cabinet!! **Did you know** that pharmaceutical products break down over time? They can become ineffective, contaminated, or unstable. Here are some helpful tips for an effective medicine cabinet cleanup to keep you and your family safe:

- Remove prescription medications that are old or that you no longer take
- Remove expired non-prescription medications, including cough/cold, pain, first aid and vitamins
- Remove medicines no longer in their original containers or with labels that can't be read
- Remove medications that have changed colour, smell or taste

Now that you have identified items for disposal it's important to get rid of them safely, to ensure the safety of children and pets never throw medication in the garbage. Also... **BE GOOD TO THE ENVIRONMENT!!** Don't flush medication down the toilet. That's where your local pharmacy comes in!!! They are happy to incur the cost of ensuring safe and environmentally friendly disposal of medications. Bring all the medicines you have cleaned out to be disposed of safely. If you have questions, your local Pharmacist is there to help.

Whoever the visitor, take the time to find out what type of feed different critters enjoy, grab your camera and sit back on your back deck and wait for the action to start.




Municipal, District Education Council and Regional Health Authority Elections will be taking place on May 11th, 2020.

The Rural Community of Hanwell will be participating in our third municipal election. Your elected council consists of four ward councillors, two councillors-at-large and the mayor. All of these positions are open for election. If you have an interest in taking on an active role in the community this may be the opportunity for you.

Hanwell is a young community; our population has seen steady growth - in 2006 we were 3812 and in 2016 our population was 4750. The construction of the new K-8 school in Hanwell will likely result in new housing and corresponding population growth. There will be a need to have a strong vision for our community's development and this is the time to ensure that the vision is inclusive for all.

Would you like to actively guide the community forward, have an opportunity to represent the residents of Hanwell at the council chamber table? Then consider becoming a candidate. It does require a time commitment but the rewards are many.
