

#### **Sharing Talents in Hanwell Rural Community**

#### A Story by Ross Mathers

Last fall, when a large tree in his front yard was damaged in a windstorm, Island View resident, Ross Mathers, went searching for a way to keep the Maple as a treasured focal point in his front yard. Could the three-meter-high tree trunk be transformed from a ragged eye-sore to an attractive piece of lawn art?

Luckily, the impressive chainsaw skills of a Starlite Village resident, presented a solution for Mathers. In very short order, Romeo Poitras, turned the unsightly stump into an impressive carving that included a hummingbird on the top, six flowers representing the Mathers' six grandchildren, some mushrooms, a birdhouse, and several other features.

The finished carving was burned in several places to provide accents. A small amount of black paint was used to emphasize several lines. Three coats of a preservative were then applied to protect the outdoor masterpiece from weathering. The project was the first actual tree carving completed by Poitras, who usually works on chain saw art in his shop. Good ideas and creative recycling turned into an unusual and unique landscape feature, which is full of meaning for the Mathers family.

## **News From the Redemption Centre**

#### There is exciting news to share about recycling in Hanwell Rural Community.

First off, for residents who have always cringed a bit when tossing an empty glass jar into the garbage bin, recent changes in provincial recycling regulations give people the chance to keep glass out of the local landfill. For years, there were no alternatives because of low or no market value for empty, non-refundable glass food containers in New Brunswick. The materials went directly into the landfill rather than being moved through the blue box program to the recycle centre. Then a pilot project started in Oromocto to accept food grade glass empties at a partnering redemption centre. The program's success resulted in it being adopted at other locations province-wide, including the Hanwell Industrial Park.

Wanda Hood-Pottle is Operations Manager, at the Southside Redemption Centre, one of the new glass recycling project locations. "People have told us how much they wanted a program like this", she said. Her operation now accepts drop-offs of non-refundable glass jars and bottles, at 70 Timothy Avenue South, Hanwell Rural Community, as well as at all the company's other locations in the Fredericton Area.

Glass recycling is simple and easy to do, but a few conditions apply for this new project. Most important is that the food grade glass containers and/or bottles must be in a separate bin or box from refundable beverage containers. The non-refundable glass must be clean inside and out, but the labels can be left on. Caps or lids are not accepted, nor is cookware, ceramic, Pyrex, or window glass. "Just give us a call or check our website if you have questions", says Hood-Pottle.

Another bit of news about recycling is for residents and clubs or organizations in Hanwell Rural Community, who try to raise funds by collecting redeemable beverage containers. There is a drive-through service offered now, which makes it much more convenient for volunteers to use. "Just call 506-450-9247 to register", Hood-Pottle recommends, "or check our website: southsideredemption.com". Once a group gets a registration number, they will need to put that number on all of the bags of redeemables left at the redemption centre's drive through door. "We will process the bags the next day and send payment via e-transfer" explains Hood-Pottle. Recycling just got much easier for Hanwell Rural Community residents.


